Where do forest birds go after nesting?

A 3-year study on the breeding demography of post-fledging habitat use of mature forest birds in Southern Indiana

Wednesday, February 21, 7 p.m.

Patrick Ruhl will share some of his research findings on the habitat associations of mature forest bird species in southern Indiana. Many mature forest birds (Worm-eating Warbler, Wood Thrush, Ovenbird, Scarlet Tanager, Red-eyed Vireo and more) utilize different habitat types after the nesting stage of the breeding season, but the specific habitat associations of these species are largely unknown. A better understanding of habitat use for Indiana breeding birds throughout the entire duration of the breeding season will allow us to better conserve these species while they visit Indiana for the summer. Patrick has been researching breeding demography and postfledging ecology of mature forest birds in the Morgan-Monroe and Yellowwood state forests since 2015. In this talk, he will share some recent results of his radio-tracking and bird-banding studies.



Patrick Ruhl is from West Lafayette, and has been studying avian ecology under the direction of Dr. Barny Dunning at Purdue University over the last four years. During his Ph.D.

research, Patrick has worked on a variety of projects involving the breeding demography and habitat-use of Indiana birds. His research has focused mainly on the mature forest bird response to even-aged management, but in addition, he has also researched Worm-eating Warbler roosting and nesting habitat preference, and trophic associations of mature forest birds within the Indiana portion of the breeding range. In August 2018, Patrick will be headed to Harding University in Searcy, Arkansas to teach biostatistics and continue his Worm-eating Warbler research, studying migratory connectivity of Worm-eating Warblers that breed in the Ozark National Forest.

Fox Grant Supports Student Research

Since its inception in 2016, the Fox Student Grant has supported two student researchers, both of whom sought to expand our understanding of Cerulean Warblers.

The <u>Cerulean Warbler</u> is a migratory songbird that is listed by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service as a "species of conservation concern" and listed as an endangered species in the State of Indiana. This beautiful wood warbler forages for insects high in the hardwood forest canopy of central and eastern United States, including mature white oaks in southeastern Indiana. The <u>National Audubon Society</u> reports "strongly declining numbers" due in part to "increasing cowbird parasitism."

Clayton Delancey, the 2016 Fox Student Grant recipient, used radio transmitters to track the movements of fledgling Cerulean Warblers as they moved from their nests to shrubs and up through the tree canopy. These fledglings were difficult to capture because they did not usually come low enough in the canopy to catch, Areas with increased abundances of vegetation density, grapes, and ground cover were found to be key variables in identifying where fledgling Cerulean Warblers move to after leaving their nests. Interestingly, they were found in areas composed of fewer mature white oak stems, which is an important tree

species utilized by Cerulean Warblers during nesting.

In 2017, Garrett MacDonald was awarded funds that allowed him to purchase an automated recording unit, or ARU, which is a passive audio recording device that can be deployed in the environment for long periods of time. Garrett's project aims to assess patterns of geographic variation of Cerulean Warbler songs across the species' breeding range using archived song recordings as well as personal audio recordings of songs from a population in Indiana.

For the 2018 Fox Student Grant, Robert Cooper Audubon is now accepting proposals for bird-centered student research. The grant is made possible by a generous donation from Josie and Geoff Fox, long-time members of Robert Cooper Audubon and recipients of the 2017 Robert H. and Esther L. Cooper Conservation Award. The Fox Student Grant will provide an undergraduate or graduate degree-seeking student with up to \$1000 to purchase supplies and/or support for travel and field research expenses. 
2017 RCAS Christmas Bird Count Results

On December 17, 2017, Robert Cooper Audubon Society (RCAS) hosted the Audubon Christmas Bird Count (CBC) within a 15-mile circle centered in Muncie.

During the RCAS December 17th count, fifteen individuals forming six teams plus an additional feeder counter reported a total of 56 species and 5,289 birds. As noted in Table 1, most common were the nonnative European Starlings which continue to out-compete native species. With only single sightings were a Northern Shoveler, Bald Eagle, Peregrine Falcon, and Red-breasted Nuthatch.
